- **† About Communion** All who have been baptized in any Christian denomination are welcome to take Holy Communion.
- † **Restrooms** are located upstairs through the "Cry Room" or downstairs at the bottom of the staircase to the right. Ask anyone for directions.

Your people, whom you brought up out of the land of Egypt, have acted perversely; ⁸they have been quick to turn aside from the way that I commanded them; they have cast for themselves an image of a calf, and have worshiped it and sacrificed to it, and said, 'These are your gods, O Israel, who brought you up out of the land of Egypt!'" ⁹The LORD said to Moses, "I have seen this people, how stiff-necked they are. ¹⁰Now let me alone, so that my wrath may burn hot against them and I may consume them; and of you I will make a great nation."



We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God. eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate: he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.





O Take a fascinating journey through the lands of the New Testament as host Michael Card, renowned Christian musician and author, examines the Gospel of Luke and stirs your imagination with insights into the life of Christ. Thursday Morning Bible Study: Romans: "Not Ashamed of the Gospel" Continues

When Paul authored his letter to the small house churches of Rome, his intent was to gain prayerful support for his mission to the western Mediterranean world. Little did he know that this letter would have the impact it did (even 2,000 years later). God did a mighty work through his servant Paul. The message and legacy of his letters are his commenting upon, expanding and drawing out the implications of Jesus' teachings. Quite often we see clearly his references from the Gospels. This study will offer selections from Romans (often paired with a Gospel passage) on some of Paul's major



themes; such as, the righteousness of God, sin and death, the cross and resurrection of Jesus, faith and salvation, the responsibilities of the Christian life, law and grace. 

9/11 Memorial Pools [https://www.911memorial.org/visit/memorial/about-memorial]

The focal points of the 9/11 Memorial in New York City are two pools, each nearly an acre in size, that sit in the footprints of the former North and South Towers of the World Trade Center. The pools contain the largest manmade waterfalls in North America, each descending 30 feet into a square basin. From there, the water in each pool drops another 20 feet and disappears into a smaller, central void.

According to the architect, Michael Arad, the pools represent "absence made visible." Although water flows into the voids, they can never be filled. The sound of the cascading water makes the pools a place of tranquility and contemplation separate from the bustling noises of the city.



The <u>names</u> of the 2,983 people who were killed in the 2001 and 1993 terrorist attacks are inscribed on bronze parapets edging the memorial pools. The names are grouped by the locations and circumstances in which victims found themselves during the attacks. The North Pool parapets include the names of those who were killed at the North Tower, on hijacked Flight 11, and in the 1993 bombing. The South Pool parapets include the names of first responders as well as victims who were killed at the South Tower, on hijacked Flight 175, at the Pentagon, on hijacked Flight 77, and on hijacked Flight 93. Within these groupings, names are arranged in a system of "meaningful adjacencies." Friends and colleagues appear together, as well as the crews of each of the four flights and first responder agencies and units. Additionally, during the Memorial's development, victims' next of kin were invited to request that their loved ones' names be inscribed alongside specific others. In this way, those who were connected in life reside together on the Memorial.
